

Privacy Statement for Donors

Who We Are and Important Information

Edinburgh Food Project (also referred to as 'EFP', 'the charity', 'we', 'our' or 'us') is the Controller over any personal data we process about you for the purposes set out in this Privacy Notice (see below). This Privacy Statement sets out the type of personal information we collect about you, why we collect it, and how we use it when you make any donation to us including financial or food donations.

It is important that you read this Privacy Statement together with our <u>website privacy policy</u> which contains more detailed information about our data processing or you can request a copy from us.

What Personal Data we collect and how this is collected

We collect:

- your contact details (your name, address, email address and phone number), reason for donation where appropriate (i.e. in memory of someone) and job title (if a corporate donor);
- Specific information you provide to us when you make a financial donation to us.
 - If you send us a Standing Order form or a cheque, it will also include your bank account details.
 - o If you send us a Gift Aid form, it will also include the fact you are a UK taxpayer
 - If you just send us money direct to our bank account, our account records will just show your name, date and amount paid.
- Any additional information you provide to use when you donate to us, for example the best time for us to collect the items from you.

We also collect your personal information from different sources, where you have donated via third parties such as your payment bureau provider administering payments, Just Giving, Common Good, and Easy Fundraising.

Purposes of using your Personal Data and lawful basis we rely on

We use your personal data to:

- process and/or administer your donation
- contact you about donations. For Example, to thank you for donations, or to prompt you about delivery arrangements, help with food donations, financial donations.
- Donation forms may also record that you are happy to receive communications from us. In this
 case we may also use your data to send you newsletters or information about the work of the
 charity.

We will only use your personal data when the law allows us to. Most commonly, we will use your personal data in the following circumstances where:

We need to perform the contract we are about to enter into or have entered into with you.

- It is necessary for our legitimate interests (or those of a third party) and your interests and
 fundamental rights do not override those interests. Typically, our legitimate interests in respect of
 donations are to keep data accurate and relevant and to process donations for benefit of the Charity.
- We need to comply with a legal obligation, such as to process direct debit under a direct debit agreement.
- You have given us your consent. You have the right to withdraw consent to marketing at any time by contacting us.

Who do you share my information with?

We may share your personal information with external third parties such as with our franchisor the Trussell Trust (food donations only), our third-party service providers, HMRC for purposes of Gift Aid, payment bureau providers administering the payment, Easy Fundraising, Common Good, Sharepoint and Xero. International Transfers

We don't transfer your personal data outside the UK.

How long do we keep records for?

We will only keep your personal data for as long as reasonably necessary, you can find out more found in our website privacy policy.

Your Legal Rights

Under certain circumstances, you have rights under data protection laws concerning your personal data including the right to receive a copy of the personal data we hold about you, the right to rectification, restriction, erasure, objection, as well as the right to portability. You also have the right to make a complaint at any time to a supervisory authority which is the Information Commissioner's Office in the UK and is the regulator for data protection issues (www.ico.org.uk).
